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





Summary	A 3-week academic boot camp offered at every community college for any TN Promise student requiring remediation in any subject.	A 10-week program designed to address summer melt in south Memphis by providing 18 credit-bearing hours of co-requisite instruction coupled with high impact practices.

OBJECTIVE

To increase retention and completion of TN Promise students by implementing a proactive, high-impact coaching model for at-risk student populations

APPROACH

To incorporate more targeted interventions with at-risk populations in an effort to build deeper student relationships, support students in times of need and ensure students know where to find resources throughout their college experience

DATA


To build upon tnAchieves' comprehensive student tracking system by updating student communications with coaches in real time and merging these connections with institutional data to provide a monthly report of interventions and their effect on student outcomes

COACHING MODEL

COMPLETE INTERVENTIONS

An intervention is a round of communication attempts. Coaches attempt to intervene until a connection is made ever 21-day period and have a goal of completing 75 interventions per week.

In an effort to be most relational but also have the ability to conduct this model at scale, interventions are completed in the following order.



In-person meetings are only utilized on an as-needed basis when other interventions are not sufficient.

COMPLETE SUCCESS

Students with an EFC of zero assigned to tnAchieves completion coaches are outpacing their non-coached peers and zero EFC-tnAchieves students overall.






